Sexual violence is an epidemic on college campuses nationwide. More than one in five women will be sexually assaulted while enrolled, and the rates for LGBTQ students are even higher. This talk, given by one of the nation's leading advocates on this issue, explores how student survivors connected over social media, held their institutions accountable under the federal gender equity law Title IX, and framed campus rape as a national crisis. This presentation will focus on common issues that arise in the campus and criminal justice frameworks when dealing with sexual violence, and finally, recommend survivor-centric policy changes.

Learning Objectives:

1. Understand the importance of social media, Title IX, and media framing in raising awareness of campus sexual violence.
2. Become familiar with the prevalence of sexual violence on college campuses for different demographic groups, as well as and common issues that survivors face when considering filing a report or seeking counseling.
3. Learn about survivor-centric policy recommendations for enhancing prevention and response to campus sexual violence.

Sofie Karasek is the Director of Education and Co-founder of the organization End Rape on Campus (EROC). This organization works to end campus sexual violence through direct support for survivors and their communities; prevention through education; and policy reform at the campus, local, state, and federal levels. She has been a leading advocate for California's groundbreaking affirmative consent law and her work has been featured in national and international media, including The Wall Street Journal, The Guardian, CNN, and Bloomberg Businessweek. She is also a subject in the documentary film "The Hunting Ground," which provides a comprehensive description of the issue of sexual violence on college campuses.
